Each year London's hospitals, including London Health Sciences Centre, the Children's Hospital of Western Ontario at London Health Sciences Centre and St. Joseph's Health Care, London collectively serve the needs of well over one million patients.

Proceeds from the lottery are important because they are 'undesignated funds,' meaning that they are not restricted to use in any particular area but can be used to support each hospitals' highest priority needs," said Dan Ross, President and CEO of London Health Sciences Foundation.

Although the province covers, among other things, operating costs for hospitals, foundations help raise money for items such as research and specialized equipment.

"We're thrilled to have had such strong support for this year's program which led to an early sellout," said Michelle Campbell, President & CEO of St. Joseph's Health Care Foundation. "All the funds stay in our community and make a real difference to care we provide."
